The following questions are based on the textbook by Sheila Curran Bernard. You will need to <u>refer closely to the textbook</u> to answer the questions properly.

- Watch your selected feature-length documentary *completely* before you begin trying to answer the questions.
- Answer all of the questions based *specifically* and *exactly* on <u>your</u> <u>selected documentary</u>. Do not generalize! Also, do not be redundant in your answers. If you keep writing the same thing, you're not trying hard enough.
- **Type** your complete answers <u>in a numbered format</u> (numbers matching the questions below) in MS Word (or equivalent).
- **E-mail** the Word document to me as an attachment by the deadline.

Chapter 2

- 1. What is in the **exposition** of this documentary? (pp. 15–17)
- Explain in one or two sentences the train of this documentary. (pp. 17– 19)
- 3. What is the **theme** of this documentary? (pp. 19–20)
- 4. Explain in one or two sentences the **story arc** of this documentary. (pp. 20–21)
- 5. Is this documentary **character**-driven or **plot**-driven? Support your answer with an explanation.(pp. 21–22)
- 6. Who or what is this documentary about? (pp. 23-24) Be simple and brief.
- 7. What does the protagonist want, or what are the objective(s) or goal(s) of the central character? (pp. 24–25)
- 8. Briefly describe the **tension** or **conflict** that drives the train. (pp. 25–28)

- 9. How well did the filmmaker **involve you** in the experience? (pp. 28–30) Discuss whether or not the stakes were raised, and explain.
- 10. How did the **ending** meet, or fail to meet, the criteria spelled out in pp. 30–31?

- 11. Discuss any three (3) of the following in the context of your selected documentary:
 - a. Access and feasibility (p. 38)
 - b. Affordability (p. 39)
 - c. Passion and curiosity (p. 39)
 - d. Audience (p. 40)
 - e. Relevance (p. 41)
 - f. Timeliness (p. 41)
 - g. Visualization (p. 42)
- 12. Explain in one or two sentences the **hook** of this documentary. (pp. 42–43)

Chapter 4

- 13. Briefly describe the **approaches** used in this documentary, using the examples in the text (pp. 47–52) as a guide.
- 14. Discuss the **biases** or subjective point(s) of view in this documentary in terms of the audience having trust, or losing trust, in the filmmaker. Use the text (pp. 52–54) as a guide. (We don't expect a documentary to be wholly objective.)
- 15. Address each of the remaining three sections in Chapter 4 (pp. 54–60) and, **for each one,** explain *whether* and *how* it is relevant to this documentary.
